Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to ensure that young people have the opportunity to experience residential outdoor education.

The consultation runs from 29 April 2022 to 22 July 2022

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill? (Please note that this question is compulsory.)

Fully supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response.

I was fortunate enough to be educated in Fife in the 70s where, certainly as a state school pupil at Queen Anne High School, the outdoors and sport and general were encouraged. I spent two residential weeks at Ardroy Outdoor centre one involving field studies and the outdoors and another a multi activity experience. I look back on these experiences and other similar provided by the Fife Education Authority of the time as formative both personally and empowering me to think I of the outdoors as a way to develop potential and expectations in others. It was definitely a factor in my desire to lead and facilitate other in their experience of personal development in the great outdoors. It was with a great personal sadness that we witnessed the attempted closure and subsequent disposal of Ardroy by a less enlightened Fife Council of the current day. Only by the personal dedication of others has this centre survived such cultural vandalism and has endured as a private entity.

Many residential school outdoor centres have closed or had funding cut due to lack of support and foresight by the Scottish Government of today.

Q2. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the proposed Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

Legislation is required it it is also essential that a policy body and caucus is established to restablish residential activity and outdoor education as a right. Cash strapped councils often see such activities as middle class or extras. This is understandable if very shortsighted. Widening experience and exposing every child in Scotland to opportunity for self development outside the urban setting should be a right. It is a shame that Scotland seemed at the forefront of this when I was a youngster but has now regressed.

Fully opposed

Whatever sector you are educated in residential outdoor provision should be a right otherwise the basic ethos behind the bill is not being upheld. The fact that many independent establishments offer this should not exempt the sector from the scope of the bill.

Without obligation it would be difficult to ensure the provision was made available. However additional funding must be made available to local authorities or the few direct grant schools that still exist. Without this it is difficult to see how the aims of the bill being achieved within most local authorities current education budgets.

In the last 20 years there had been an increased closure and dismantling of school outdoor facilities and centres. Laganlia and some others are notable exceptions. Significant finds will be needed to reinstate

I am frustrated that the options on this questionnaire are seen to be mutually exclusive! Infrastructure should be fully funded and developed by Scottish Government and additional funds made available as a ring fenced provision for actual participation in the residential activities to local authorities. It would be wonderful to think that these places could be fully funded. In reality some contribution would have to come from parents/carers, with social funding being made through from appropriate sources to defray or eliminate the costs to those who struggle financially.

It may be that without access to government/education authority residential facilities places may need to be provided at privately owned centres/by private providers on a per capita basis.

a significant increase in costs

Please explain the reasons for your answer, including who you would expect to feel the financial impact of the proposal, and if there are any ways you think the proposal could be delivered more cost-effectively.

This is a difficult question to answer as it depends on what model the Government of the time would implement.

Large central government costs would be needed to increase infrastructure and reinstate the provision that has been lost or downgraded over the years. From personal experience finding centres and residential accommodation for pupils is increasingly difficult. There is also a staffing and trading cost. Not just to staff centres but to train staff to become facilitators of outdoor learning. Residential experiences work best where staff are part of the experience and not just residential babysitting handing over their charges to outsourced provision.

For businesses and residential providers it would in increase cash flow and be cash positive in the long term. However if a hybrid model of Education Authority Centres with Private Providers is envisaged. Medium or long term contacts would need to be negotiated carefully to enable financial accountability as well as security for external providers to invest.

Standard/ Quality of provision

I am not sure the HMIE currently has the correct expertise. Residential educational centres/schools are also subject to Care Commission inspection. Centres and providers which provide adventurous activities are also inspected and regulated by ALAA. Professional instructors are also regulated and certified by their professional bodies. All of these elements need to be taken into account and are enacted in the running of centre such as Laganlia.

I think it important that quality is monitored and regulated but much care needs to be taken here. There is a quality's to the outdoor experience which cannot be solely assigned to learning outcomes matrices and learning outcomes.

Q8. Which of the following best expresses your view that the age range of 12 – 16 is appropriate for participation in the residential outdoor education experience?

Partially supportive

I considered ticking fully supportive but then thought that II should think more widely. I think a two day residential experience should be available during S1 for 12 year olds which may or may not be in the outdoors. Many schools have or are offering this.

If we re looking at getting the best returns from such a weeks scheme the sweet spot for participation is when they are a bit more physically and emotionally mature. I would at the perfect age is 14-15. ie S3. The last session before they are involved with National exams. Or a Summwr term even for S4 pupils of 15-16 after National exams. We should not necessarily close out 16-18 year olds but must be aware that greater benefits for individual development can be achieved earlier in their schooling. I full believe that residential experience. Be made available through trips and activity camps throughout the senior years. I do also believe that a one week experience minimum should be a right.
