

Proposed Schools (Residential Outdoor Education) (Scotland) Bill

Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to ensure that young people have the opportunity to experience residential outdoor education.

The consultation runs from 29 April 2022 to 22 July 2022

If the finance is provided by the Scottish Government then there will be a cost to them, however this should be weighed against the funding that will be provided to outdoor centres and their staff, many of which are based in areas remote areas with limited job opportunities. Also against the value of the experience it provides the young people and helps them in their future

Standard/ Quality of provision

As with all things there are different qualities of outdoor education provided and therefore some kind of framework should be provided so that people are not provided with sub quality experiences due to circumstances such as their postcode. The outdoor industry does provide some internal quality assurance which might prove to be enough. Scotland is home to World Class academics such as Prof Pete Higgins at the University of Edinburgh who will be able to consult on this.

Q8. Which of the following best expresses your view that the age range of 12 – 16 is appropriate for participation in the residential outdoor education experience?

Partially supportive

Ideally young people should be exposed to as many opportunities as possible at various ages as they will get different things from the experience at different times. I would propose one experience at a younger age (P5-7) and one at a slightly older age (S1-3)

I do not believe that any example above would not benefit or be able to participate in outdoor activities. Some outdoor providers will be better suited to certain needs than others and in rare cases using experts in other areas of the UK (such as Bendrigg Trust in the Lake District who are set up for those with more serious disabilities) should be considered

If there was a government department in charge of matching schools and centres and government funding provided then all pupils should be able to receive a broadly equitable experience
