Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to ensure that young people have the opportunity to experience residential outdoor education.

The consultation runs from 29 April 2022 to 22 July 2022

There would be increased spending by the Government to achieve this. It would be partially off set by the parent/guardian contributions but it would also further offset by the investment in the outdoor sector. Increased employment in activity providers (individuals and companies) would provide income tax revenue and business tax revenue. Hopefully if new residential centres were built for the scheme they could supplement their costs by hiring the venues to groups outwith the local educational authority.

There needs to be quality assurance for safety reasons as well as making sure the children are getting maximum benefit from the courses. I'm not knowledgeable enough about the framework used by schools and whether it would be a good fit to the outdoor learning environment. Paperwork can often get in the way of good practice as people are too busy filling out paperwork to make sure of good practice. Also the nature of the workforce in the outdoor sector is different to that of teachers. Teachers are expected to and regularly fill out much paperwork as part of their jobs where as that is much less the case in the outdoor environment when the large number of variables mean decisions are often dynamic and taken on the hoof when there is no time to sit down and fill out paper work.
