Introduction

A proposal for a Bill to ensure that young people have the opportunity to experience residential outdoor education.

The consultation runs from 29 April 2022 to 22 July 2022

Scouts Scotland is one of the largest co-educational youth work charities in Scotland supporting 46000 members. our members span from 4 years old to adults and take part in an outdoor based youth work programme designed to develop skills for life for our members and help them become the best version of themselves as possible. Scouting takes place in almost every community in Scotland and is a universal provision open to all. Our residential outdoor centres had a pre-pandemic foot fall of 69,142 made up of a mix of schools, scouts and other youth groups.

Q1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill? (Please note that this question is compulsory.)

Fully supportive

Please explain the reasons for your response.

We are fully supportive of statutory provision for all young people to access outdoor learning. We feel that the bill is in keeping with Scouting's principles and values and drive for universal access to outdoors programmes. We look forward to working with government to define a clearer understanding of the provision while providing clarity around the mechanisms of delivery and funding to reassure as many young people benefit as part of a lifelong provision towards outdoor learning.

Q2. Do you think legislation is required, or are there other ways in which the proposed Bill's aims could be achieved more effectively? Please explain the reasons for your response.

We feel Legislation is required. The decline in local authority run outdoor centres highlights the pressure on LA's and shows a decline in the value placed on residentials. If funds were not required as a statutory provision funds may end up diverted or prioritised in other places as organisations make decisions on the value of outdoor learning against other priorities.

We feel there is no problem with the requirement for independent schools being legally required to provide the same minimum provision as part of a universal provision yet we would not support any funding being directed to the independent sector. We feel strongly about equity but feel most independent schools will already be providing this level of provision and funding would be better placed where required.

It is vital that someone is ultimately responsible and should be identified. We feel the education authority are best positioned to provide the statutory provision inline with local rules and requirements for each educational provision.

Funding

The funding should be specific, provided by Scottish government and ring fenced for delivery through local authorities directly to schools. Every attempt should be made to limit third parties and intermediary's involvement in the funding and projects. A situation like NCS funding south of the border should be avoided where funds were diluted at multiple stages before getting to the young people who could benefit from the funding. Money should take as direct as possible route to reach where it is needed. Another option is Funding to be ring fenced and delivered with PEF funding to allow head teacher the decision of when and where to use funds.

clarity is needed on the full extend of the provision requested and levels of delivery needed before a cost assessment can be undertaken. A minimum level of requirements and standards would need to be set to ensure value for money and quality of provision. There may be costs upfront depending on the level of provision requested and requirements to expand equipment stores to meet demand an ensure sustainability in line with business increase.

Standard/ Quality of provision

Fully supportive

At a time when the industry is trying to move away from a formal inspection processes from HSE we are cautious with bringing in additional inspections and red tape. We agree some frame work or guidance in level of provision is required but formalising inspection with HMIE could be a step backwards. We would be uncomfortable with a provision without quality measurement to allow customers and parents to know we work at a set standard but could these be accommodated as part of the replacement for AALA or a self-evaluation/peer evaluation system. This could substantially reduce the cost for inspection processes and help reduce costs.

Q8. Which of the following best expresses your view that the age range of 12 - 16 is appropriate for participation in the residential outdoor education experience?

Partially opposed

Please give reasons for your response, including whether you think other age ranges would be more appropriate.

I think caution is needed in this area. There is a risk schools will use this as a method to fund DofE provision and not necessarily use it for residential provision at this age range. This would risk emulating the English NCS provision and duplicating all of its faults. I think the message needs to be about supporting the continuum of outdoor learning from early years all the way through to adult participation and life long involvement in outdoor activities. Some providers will not be used to working with large groups of teenagers and will not be set up for some of the challenges or logistics regarding equipment and resources to work with these age ranges, many will take it in their stride but others will struggle. by using ages and not year groups you risk splitting classes as S1 could have 11and 12 year olds in the group thus we think flexibility needs to be built in to the options or be clear on year groups being targeted.

Equalities

As an organisation we are open to all and would work with all young people. We support the provision across all protected characteristic but acknowledge there will be possible areas which this could be difficult and additional thought to how this provision is undertaken. We have plans in place to work with young people from all protected characteristics and we will take appropriate and reasonable steps to ensure all young people have access.

I feel some centres in Scotland are not as accessible as they could be regarding access and accessible activities. Across the UK there are specialist centres who work with larger groups with disabilities and impairments and there may be a need to develop similar provision in Scotland or offer to include specialist provision to ensure all young people have the same level of provision available particularly to insure additional needs schools can be catered for?

Q10. How might equity of provision for all be ensured, regardless of socio-economic status? Please give reasons for your response.

A universal provision would ensure all young people benefited. Step should be taken to ensure centres had equipment to borrow and all participants were given all the provision and support needed be able to take part.

Sustainability

I think the proposed steps will work to address some of the points raised such as linking young people to the environment and creating connectiveness. The residential experience could work as a catalyst to further work on these areas once they have been given a real-life working context to the learning. I think steps would be required to ensure any provision is not viewed as being in place of other work such as Learning For Sustainability or other initiatives and should be viewed as an addition rather than a replacement.

General

Q12. Do you have any other additional comments or suggestions on the proposed Bill (which have not already been covered in any of your responses to earlier questions)?

As scouts Scotland we support the principles of the bill and what it is trying to achieve. I think care needs to be taken in some areas to prevent it being manipulated to fit the current provision and ensure it keeps to its principles. I feel that if it is to be successful there needs to be continued work across the political spectrum for cross party agreement on this subject area and not to allow this to become a party-political issue. The bill has potential to have long lasting and meaningful impact on the lives of young people across Scotland and give our young people a step up in life when it is most vitally needed. Value needs to be placed on the wider life skills gained from residential experience and the understand of other pupils values based decisions which may differ to the students personal values. These step foster understanding and tolerance across society and can help to build more adaptable and resilient communities I which we live.

We look forward to understanding the funding model and how the provision can be funded equitably. Funding cannot be siphoned from other areas and progress created at the detriment of other services like youthwork.
